Resident-on-resident harassment hurts all

As a housing provider, we have a responsibility to all who are in our community o make sure that you know how you and others are granted protection under Fair Housing laws.

We will respond to any and all complaints of harassment, threats, or intimidation related to race, national origin, religion, disability, gender, marital status, familial status (presence of children), source of income, sexual orientation, domestic partner status, and gender identity against community members or staff.

If we are informed of, or witness, a behavior that is considered a violation of Fair Housing laws, we will take timely and appropriate action. We will notify the person(s) accused of the problem behavior of the following:

- The behavior that occurred or was said to occur, and how the behavior is a violation of Fair Housing laws
- That such behavior will not be tolerated
- Potential or actual actions that we will take in order to enforce Fair Housing protections

If you have questions about what types of behaviors are considered harassment, threats, or intimidation, please contact the Fair Housing Council of Oregon (503) 223-8197 or (800) 424-3247.

We hope that community members who experience an interaction, which may be a Fair Housing violation, will report the incident to Northview quickly. We will not allow retaliation against a resident who comes forward with a complaint about such behavior or is a witness who supports the complaint.

Our standard is that we will communicate respectfully with one another and we will speak out if we are mistreated or witness others being mistreated. If you are uncomfortable talking to us about an incident, please contact the Fair Housing Council of Oregon at (503) 223-8197 or (800) 424-3247.

Good neighbor policies, explained

e all strive to live in a strong, safe, and sustainable community. Good neighbor policies are designed to help residents find harmony and maintain the vitality of their neighborhood. While not necessarily required policies, most good neighbor tenants are based on the "Golden Rule"—that is, to treat others as you would like them to treat you.

If conflicts should arise between neighbors, take the opportunity to address your concerns with the other party first, in a manner that is both respectful and nonjudgmental. What began as a dispute could end in an opportunity to build trust and understanding between neighbors.

The following are just a few techniques for maintaining good neighbor relationships provided from page 47 of the RECOA ARC Guidelines. You can view the full list online at: http://www.ridgeowners.org/info.php? pnum=9.

- Orient exterior activity areas away from neighbors
- Use fire resistant plants to provide privacy to you or your neighbor and minimize wildfire risk
- Screen solar devices, satellite dishes, radio antennae and other equipment form neighbors' views to the maximum amount possible
- Provide adequate lighting for safe traverse of paths of limited outdoor activities without spilling light onto your neighbor's property
- Limit light intensity by using lower wattage bulbs in your fixtures
- Consider how landscape additions could eventually grow to obstruct your neighbors' views when planning for installation of additional landscaping

Remember the old adage: kindness is contagious!

Drainage system improvements to come to West Ridge

The Storm Water Improvements Committee (SWIC) is pleased to announce the completion of our latest project – the Rockside/William Lyche Drainage Project.

Drainage from North Cline Butte flows down toward Rockside Court and then

along William Lyche to Eagle Crest Boulevard. In the past, this water has damaged homes and common areas. The purpose of the project was to minimize such damage from future runoff events. All portions of the new drainage system are located on RE-COA common area.


The upper part of this new system from the base of the North Cline Butte to William Lyche will intercept most of the runoff from the North Butte upgradient from Rockside Court. This resulted in a relatively steep drainage ditch running down the slope.

The portion of the system that parallels William Lyche had to have a large

enough capacity to not only handle the water from the upper portion of the ditch but also from William Lyche which is substantial. This portion of the ditch also has less slope and has four culverts. This requires the ditch to be wider and to include stilling basins at each culvert. The river rock not only protects the ditch but improves its appearance, making it look somewhat like a water feature. When laying out the ditch, the SWIC took great care to avoid removing trees.

If you have lived in Eagle Crest for five years or more you will have witnessed the kinds of runoff events that made this project necessary.

Know your association policies: garbage cans and lighting

eeping the Ridge at Eagle Crest a great place to live in requires its inhabitants follow the policies and guidelines established by your RECOA Board of Directors and the Architectural Review Committee. These standards address some of the problems that may

inhibit good neighbor relations and an aesthetically pleasing neighborhood. All governing documents can be found on the Ridge Owners website at

www.ridgeowners.org.

Two issues of concern right now at the Ridge are:

- The many garbage cans left on the curb preceding and following garbage pickup and
- 2) Visually intrusive outdoor lighting

The Association Policies and Procedures for Use and Enjoyment of the Ridge at Eagle Crest by Its Owners (2015) state that "...trash cans and containers shall be allowed to be set out only during the days on which rubbish is collected and after sundown of the preceding evening. (p. 6)" Simply put, the Master Association requires that owners put out trash cans after sunset the day before or during the day of garbage collection. If you live in West Ridge, that means trash

cans can be on the curb **only** between sunset Wednesday night and pickup on Thursday. At the East Ridge, garbage goes out between sunset Thursday night and pickup on Friday. Garbage cans must be returned to their enclosures following garbage pickup on the

same day. If you are leaving town, consider coordinating garbage collection and storage with a neighbor or visiting the Negus Transfer Station on your way out of town.

We've also received an increase in complaints about intru-

sive lighting. The ARC Policies and Guidelines (2014) take up the topic of exterior lighting by stating "No flood-lighting or up-lighting will be permitted. Illumination necessary for evening activities must be directed downward and be only bright enough to provide for the safe traverse of steps and paths. Opaque glass in the light fixtures with clear bulbs or frosted incandescent light bulbs in textured glass fixtures are permitted." Direct lights away from neighboring property, use diffused lighting, and limit your lighting by using lower wattage bulbs.



Did you know?

Northview approves temporary RV and travel trailer parking

emporary RV and travel trailer parking is coming to The Ridge at Eagle Crest. Northview has designated ten spots located next to The Ridge Sports Center for this purpose. These parking spots will be situated at the seldom-used northeast portion of the parking lot running parallel to Cooper's Hawk Drive. This location will ensure a low visual impact and will have little to no effect on Sports Center parking availability. The spaces will be striped and clearly marked for temporary RV parking. Spaces will be made available at a first-come, first-serve basis with no reservations allowed. Parking will be temporary only, and no vehicle may remain in the spaces for more than 72 hours (3 days). Owners will park at their own risk and Northview accepts no liability for damage or theft. We hope that this service will alleviate some of the frustrations experienced by visitors and travelers at Eagle Crest.



Pursuant to the RECOA rules and regulations, short term parking is allowed for only six hours on the street and 48 hours in the driveways of residences on the Ridge side of Eagle Crest. No vehicles may be parked on streets between the hours of 2:00 am and 7:00 am. Long term parking is available onsite at Ridge RV Storage (a privately-operated lot). Residents tell us that there is currently a wait list there, but you can check for yourself by calling (541) 604-4451.

Community Wildfire Protection Committee

Spring FireFree event set for Ridge homeowners

The Ridge is bordered on three sides by a highly-flammable juniper habitat and other shrubs and grasses. Ember showers from a wildfire could quickly ignite vegetation fuels and spread rapidly to homes and other structures. Creating defensible space around homes, on resort common areas, and other structures is critical to reduce the risk of wildfire damage.

The summer wildfire season is approaching and it's not too early to think about how to better protect our homes from wildfire risk. Everyone on the Ridge is encouraged to participate in this FireFree Event from Wednesday, April 22 to Sun-

day, May 3. During this time, owners may deposit flammable limbs and other hazardous yard debris street-side for free pick-up. This service will be provided only during the spring FireFree event period; there is no fall FireFree event scheduled this year.



Only eligible flammable plant debris, including evergreen limbs, sage, rabbit brush, bitterbrush, leaves, pine needles and other woody plant materials will be picked up. Cut limbs and

small trees into sections no longer than 4-feet are accepteable. Smaller qualifying plant debris must be placed in heavy duty 30-gallon paper lawn and leaf bags and placed separate from the limb pile on your property, next to the street.

No grass clippings, plastic bags, sod, rocks, household garbage, potting soil, flower planter debris, or other debris unrelated to reducing wildfire hazard will be picked up.

Updates for March 2015

Here's a look at the projects on the horizon from the MOC:

Cooper's Hawk Entrance

The Coopers Hawk entrance has had transformers installed to power uplights for the trees lining the roadway. It will look great as visitors and residents, alike, enter the Ridge.

Speed Limits

Deschutes County will be conducting a traffic study along Cline Falls Highway to determine if the speed limit should be reduced from 50 to 35 mph. County Engineer George Kolb has advised that the study will be completed by June.

RECOA is posting six 20 mph speed limit signs along Eagle Crest Boulevard on the two stretches through BLM property. We already own the signs and posts, so the only added expense is installation.

Drainage

All culverts and ditches have been inspected, so now bids have been requested to clean and repair them. We all know how much water can be deposited by summer thunderstorms, so keeping the water flowing away from our homes is a high priority.
